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# BACKGROUND

- Caring for the health needs of rural and underserved population is a specialty in itself.
- Rural and Underserved patients face different health issues than people in cities and towns or with access to more resources.
- To best serve them rural and underserved health care providers should receive specialized training and hands-on experience working with these populations.

 Seminars – learn about various topics related to rural health, such rural health care and project development.


 Patient experiences - care for patients in rural settings and shadow health care providers who practice in rural settings.






## RESULTS

### Participant pre-survey results

- 40% come from a hometown of under 7500 people.
- Self-rating scores on knowledge and abilities related to rural/underserved care were "fair" on average.
- Majority agreed with having an interest in practicing in a rural/underserved setting, but were neutral regarding preparedness and confidence











# CONCLUSION

A rural/underserved training program successfully enrolled students and is currently evaluating the impact of the program on student learning, community impact, and rural health workforce development.

# FUTURE DIRECTIONS

Explore development of a modified training program for current providers practicing in rural or underserved areas or have an interest in learning more about the needs of these patient populations
